

Mediation: What It Is

 Mediation occurs when some or all of an effect is transmitted by way of a third variable—the mediator or intervening variable



Direct and Indirect Effects

- The part of the effect that passes through the mediator is the indirect effect of X on Y (i.e., a * b)
- The part of the effect that does not pass through the mediator is the **direct effect** of X on Y (i.e., c')
- Together, the indirect and direct effect equal the total effect of X on Y (i.e., c = ab + c')

Mediation: What It's Good For

- Most commonly, a mediator is proposed as a specific mechanism by which X affects Y
 - Example: A study has its participants interact with a previously unknown partner for 5 minutes. Afterwards, their partners rate how much they enjoyed the interaction. Partners of extraverts enjoyed the interaction more than did partners of introverts. Why?

Mediation: How To Do It (Baron & Kenny, 1986)

- 1. Establish that *X* is related to *Y* (i.e., establish that there's a relationship to mediate)
 - Regress Y on X (to get c)
- 2. Establish that X is related to M
 - Regress M on X (to get a and s_a)
- 3. Establish that *M* is related to *Y*
 - Regress Y on M
- 4. Establish that there is an indirect effect of *X* on *Y* transmitted through *M*
 - Simultaneously regress Y on X and M (to get b, s_b, and c'), then use a, s_a, b, and s_b to conduct a test of the indirect effect

The Sobel Test

- The Sobel test (Sobel, 1982) is the most commonly-reported test of an indirect effect
